PREVENTION

The National Council on Substance Abuse

- Established in 1995 under aegis of the Ministry of Home Affairs
- Agency responsible for drug demand reduction activities
 & programmes
- Programmes & activities are coordinated & implemented via the agency's community, primary & secondary school programmes

The NCSA Approach



Primary School Programmes

- Life Education Centre (LEC) (Ages 3 11)
- Safe and Unsafe -(Ages 5 6)
- Just the Facts -(Ages 7 8)
- Drugs & My World (*Ages* 8 9)
- Facts & Issues -(Ages 9 10)
- Drugs and Decisions (Ages 10 11)
- Write Off Drugs (Upcoming) (Ages 7 11)

Transition Programme

- Project SOFT Transitional Programme for youth progressing from primary to secondary school.
- The Prevention First Club provides the opportunity for participants of Project SOFT to build upon their experiences.
- Also targets the parents of the children and provides practical guidance for them and their adolescent children.

Secondary School Programmes

- Adolescent Outreach (Ages 11 16)
- Peer Support Activities (Ages 13 16)
- Write Off Drugs (Upcoming) − (Ages 11 16)
- Stop! Think! Choose! (For the hearing impaired)

Parent Education Workshops

- Involve a combined range of evidence-based parent education components
- Interactive family drug education program where parents and children participate together in a range of drug education activities.

Community Programmes

- Allow officers to interface directly with the general public in order to provide substance abuse education
- Sports Intervention Programme
- In de garage; Pun de driveway!! (Upcoming)
- Gender Empowerment Programme "Eva Goes to Foreign" (Upcoming)
- Workplace Drug Prevention Programme (NEW) NCSA has undertaken baseline research that will guide the design of workplace prevention strategies

Approach to Treatment

 NCSA continues to collaborate with treatment agencies in the areas of funding and other shared resources

Recently acquired Counsellor to provide dedicated service

Challenges

- Under-financed
- Not enough staff
- Services centralised
- Hours of operation need to be reviewed

Solutions

- Engage in more advocacy
- Encourage more dialogue between partners in other social service agencies
- Establish symbiotic relationships with the private sector to enhance program development

TREATMENT

Treatment Providers

Residential

Verdun House

Non-Residential

- The Centre for Counselling Addiction Support Alternatives (CASA)
- Psychiatric Hospital (Drug Rehabilitation Unit)

Verdun House

- 60-bed facility
- Caters to males only, 18+ years of age
- 90 day treatment programme with 12 step-orientation
- Half-way house option to help re-integrate persons navigating early stages of sobriety (up to 180 days)
- Multiple treatment modalities used:
 - Individual & Group Counselling
 - Family therapy
 - Social Skills Training
 - Chemical Dependency Education
 - Attendance at AA and NA meetings
 - Relapse-prevention & After-care planning

CASA

- Caters to males & females, 12+ years of age
- Multiple services offered:
 - Assessment
 - Non-residential detoxification
 - Referral to support groups (AA, NA)
 - Individual & family counselling
 - After-care
 - The provision of skills training & drug-education programs for children & adolescents

Psychiatric Hospital

- Out-patient/day-release facility
- Caters primarily to adults
- Provides referrals for treatment at other agencies

Challenges

- Lack of residential facilities for females
- Limited treatment facilities for adolescents
- Lack of regulations regarding certification of treatment providers and facilities

Solutions

- Verdun House to offer treatment to females
- Substance Abuse Programme for Children & Adolescents (SAPCA)
- OAS/CICAD's Training and Certification Program for Drug and Violence Prevention, Treatment, and Rehabilitation (PROCCER)
