




The Chronic Violent Drug Syndrome

- Major components include:
 - Drug trafficking
 - 2. \uparrow in # of chronic and professional addicts
 - 3. Guns, guns, and more guns
 - 4. Destruction of the socio-cultural values
 - 5. Violent Gang Formation
 - 6. Sprees of violent crimes

Socio-Cultural Fragmentation

- Characterized by:
 - 1. Burgeoning murder & violent crime rates
 - 2. Poor work ethic
 - 3. Family disintegration
 - 4. Community fragmentation
 - 5. Youth gang formation

Social Fragmentation

- A process by which persons are victimized by the negativity of shame, giving them a diminished view of the world
- Shame is a powerful emotion that is usually hidden
- It results from the shattering of cherished wishes, expectations and dreams
- Shame manifests itself as:
 - Anger
 - Violence
 - Revenge
 - Addiction

Dynamics of Drug Abuse

- Brain disease
- Susceptibility
 - Sustained exposure
 - Interaction of drug effects
 - Re-enforcement phenomenon
 - Depletion of dopamine
- Recreational use
- Molecular/circuit changes in the brain


Sandilands Morbidity Report (2012)

Drug Arrests Statistics (2015)


Of the 1,499 drug arrests made in 2015, 39 were juvenile males (2.6%) and 4 were juvenile females (0.3%).

DRUG ADMISSIONS BY AGE GROUP





Prevalence of Alcohol Use Among Secondary School Students



The use of alcohol is popular among Bahamian secondary school students, with rates \uparrow from 2002 – 2011. The prevalence of alcohol consumption in females surpassed that of males. Usage \uparrow as grade level \uparrow .

Prevalence of Marijuana Use Among Secondary School Students



Since 2008, marijuana use \uparrow , with more students having tried it and more continuing to use. Males use marijuana at more than double the rate of their female counterparts. 12^{th} graders use almost 4X as much as the 8^{th} graders.

The Family: People Helping People Project



- Community-based intervention designed to ↓ social fragmentation & promote resocialization
- Uses principles based on the Contemplative Discovery Pathway Theory (CDPT)
- Liberates ppl. from shame to experience love, compassion & healing community
- Group sessions led by trained psychotherapists & facilitators


- Group process involves:
 - Storytelling
 - Reflection
 - Self-examination
 - Transformation
- Prgm. Offered in 20 marginalized, Bahamian communities including:
 - 5 adolescent groups:W.M.P.C., S.P.C., Collins Ave.(X2), East St.
 - Basketball Outreach at T.A.Thompson & Carmichael

Contemplative Discovery Pathway Theory

- CDPT motivates persons to move beyond hurt & shame to discover their authentic self based in love & gratitude
- 3 basic needs at birth
 - a) Safety (survival / security)
 - b) Connection (affection / esteem)
 - c) Empowerment (power / control)
- \square Life is wounded \rightarrow we get hurt \rightarrow S.H.A.M.E. develops
- Illusory False Self, developed to block Shame, hijacks our life's purpose

Incidence of Overt Themes in the Family Sessions




Results -The Family Pilot Study

- After Joining The Family (Current)



Q34 of the questionnaire asked 'Before joining the Family, were you in an abusive relationship?' 32.6% of participants indicated 'yes', 67.4% indicated 'no'. Q46 of the questionnaire asked 'Are you currently in an abusive relationship?' 15.7% indicated 'yes', 84.3% indicated 'no'.

Case Vignette 1

- 16 yr. old male (Sam) referred to the Family b/c he witnessed his father violently murder his mother
- He tried to intervene and was stabbed in the process
- Father is in custody awaiting trial
- Sam is supposed to testify at the trial but is conflicted
- He struggles w/ feelings of anger and forgiveness towards his dad
- He lives with a verbally abusive uncle
- He participants in grp. sessions but appears to be agitated
- He has expressed suicidal ideations on various occasions and has started 'cutting'

Case Vignette 2

- A young man stated that since he was 8 yrs. old, he discovered there was 'no love'
- He was disappointed w/ his mother and felt abandoned when she admitted him to Sandilands
- He said he only needs 3 things to survive:
 - Lighter (smoking marijuana makes him feel safe)
 - Phone connection
 - Swiss Knife power
- When asked how does he make it, he said 'one day at a time'.

November's Death

A new girl came a week ago Short, dark and hair cut low Sometimes she talked a little slow And she always kept her hands below. Her name was Sarah When she talked the room would be full with laughter She always would have a smile on her face I'm sure nobody could take her place. She came in [here] Wednesday 29th of October last week When we came from school and she saw us she only did a little peek. Now on Monday the 3rd of November we left her with her breath When we came back from school we heard of her death. Maybe she was feeling stressed But now I hope her soul may rest. We didn't know she was going to be November's death. Who knew I would be writing a poem about her without breath.

Conclusion

- Adolescence is a confusing time.
- A teen's 1st notions about drug use come from the behavior of their own family.
- Parents need to provide teens w/ love, good communication & consistent standards about drug & alcohol use.
- Teens may use drugs to escape emotions.
- Bring your teen to an adolescent Family so they can talk through their issues.
