

Trauma in the treatment of problematic drug use



Drug use in the context of trauma related to violence and armed conflict. Experience in Colombia.



- •Victims Psychosocial Care and Integral Health Program -PAPSIVI for victims of armed conflict
- •Scope of the Havana peace agreements on the subject of drugs.
- •Statutory Law on Health, the 10-year Health Plan and the National Plan for the promotion of health, prevention and treatment of substance use of SPA 2014-2021.

Concepts and fundamental aspects for intervention



• Educational Centers Model for the prevention of the drug phenomenon (CEPREDE), whose objective is to train the educational community members, aided by the establishment of institutional guidelines, to carry out actions that promote an educational environment free of drug use.

•Results obtained by community coalitions and the "Strong Families" Program.

Selective and Indicated Prevention with Adolescents: Chilean Experience



• Characteristics of the interventions developed in Chile for the school population.

•"Actuar a Tiempo" program (Act on Time). Six stages that address the integral needs of at risk youth population in the school environment, through tailor-made activities developed to achieve the objectives of selective and indicated prevention.

General and specialized human resource development needs for selective and indicated prevention, trauma and treatment: Experience of UNAM.



- Need to establish public policies aimed at reducing stigma of people suffering from mental disorders, trauma and drug use.
- Current needs to promote the monitoring and supervision of health professionals and non-professionals in the field of primary care for mental disorders and psychological disorders.

• Public policy should establish guidelines and actions for the implementation of alternatives for healthy behavior.

Products developed by the group of experts, Brazil

1. Practical guide for the implementation and systematization of strategies for early detection and brief intervention in community settings and primary health care. 2. Protocol for long-term follow-up and relapse prevention, to be used within the brief intervention models for people presenting problematic use of psychoactive substances.

Good implementation results, still with a great need for training people who carry out the activities, the evaluation of processes and results.

Systematic review of articles published in countries of the region. This review allowed the identification of great strengths, which can be adapted for implementation in other countries. Follow up on the shared information at the last meeting of the Group of Experts on Demand Reduction.

Piloting with Direct Observation, which is a very important novelty for the implementation of the guide. The most successful modality was the mixed one, where in-person training is combined and through the distance platform.





The 19 delegates from the participating countries thanked and congratulated CICAD and the presidency of the GREXPRD chaired by SENDA, for the excellent work done. They unanimously announced their willingness to work together during the next 2 years, in the elaboration of the products to be carried out within the framework of this group of experts.

Dr. Jimena Kalawski, opened a discussion to gather ideas and suggestions for the construction of the three products proposed by Chile to develop during the presidency.

Product No 1:

Recommendations for the Approach of Trauma in the treatment of problematic drug use, with emphasis on the treatment of trauma in women, adults and children

Product No 2:

Recommendations for work with adolescents in selective and indicated prevention.

Product No3:

Recommendations for Evaluation of Therapeutic Results through treatment indicators.

Agreements



Meeting agreements

It was agreed to develop these products in two phases.

First:

• Construction of a simple, short and practical document that takes into account the particularities of each country, with recommendations for implementation based on scientific evidence.

Second:

• Pilot testing, training and the identification of successful programs that can be transferred and shared with other countries.

Each country expressed its interest in participating in the elaboration of the products as follows:

Product 1: Colombia, Guatemala, Mexico, Bolivia, Ecuador, Paraguay, Peru, El Salvador, and Honduras.

Product 2: Colombia, Guatemala, Argentina, Mexico, Ecuador, Peru, Paraguay, El Salvador, Jamaica, Honduras, Bolivia, and Panama

Product 3: Colombia, Argentina, Guatemala, Mexico, Ecuador, Paraguay, Peru and Honduras.
