Introduction

- Under Objective 7c of the Plan of Action 2011-2015, the Executive Secretariat is tasked with presenting on an annual basis a **Work Plan** at the spring meeting of the CICAD commission.
- The Work Plan is to be prepared in accordance with the objectives and actions of the Hemispheric Drug Strategy and Plan of Action.
- The Work Plan is also to be presented in accordance with articles 19 and 29 of the **CICAD Statute.**



Statutory Obligations (Art 19)

- The functions of the Commission shall be...
 - To consider and approve the programs to be executed by the Executive Secretariat.
 - To study the reports, plans and annual works programs presented to it by the Executive Secretary.
 - To give assignments to the Executive Secretary that are consistent with the latter's mandates.



Statutory Obligations (Art 29)

- The Executive Secretary shall ...
 - Prepare the programs to be executed by the Executive Secretariat.
 - Submit reports to the Commission on the activities of the Executive Secretariat.
 - Serve as Secretary of the Commission during its sessions.
 - Perform the technical and administrative that the Commission entrusts.

- "CICAD is the competent regional forum to follow up on the implementation of this Strategy".
- "Its Executive Secretariat will execute programs and actions in support of this Strategy as requested by the Commission, in coordination, if necessary with other specialized organizations."

- Evaluation of efforts made by countries in implementing 27 recommendations derived from the Hemispheric Drug Strategy in 5 key areas: Institutional Strengthening, Demand Reduction, Supply Reduction, Control Measures and International Cooperation.
- The MEM Section within the Executive Secretariat of CICAD coordinates the evaluation process, and is composed of one coordinator and four specialists.





 - > \$9.04 million from specific funds.

IN-KIND AND COUNTERPART CONTRIBUTIONS

- In 2012, CICAD received \$591,940 in in-kind contributions from different sources for the implementation of its programs.
- OAS member States also provide counterpart contributions (personnel, infrastructure, logistics, etc.) to the execution of the program in its country. Overall, it is estimated that counterpart contributions finance between 10% and 30% of the total cost of a project.
- For 2013, the ES/CICAD expects to receive in-kind and counterpart contributions similar to previous years.

Institutional Strengthening

- The 2013 Work Plan addresses all 4 objectives of the Action Plan under Institutional Strengthening, with estimated expenditures of \$2.54 million dollars.
- Four sections of CICAD (Institutional Strengthening, Inter-American Observatory on Drugs, Demand Reduction and the Multilateral Evaluation Mechanism) execute activities under this area.

Objective: Establishing and/or improving drug treatment courts for drug-dependent offenders as an alternative to incarceration. Contribute to reducing: crime, relapse into drug use, and the prison population in the Americas by establishing and/or improving DTCs in OAS member states

Expected results 2013:

Closing the gap for drug offenders: The way back to society

Short Description:

Contribute to the rehabilitation of drug offenders. Strengthen the institutional capacity of the Central American and Latin American OAS member states to treat and rehabilitate drug offenders by improving their:

- (1) Alternatives to incarceration (ATI) within the criminal justice system
- (2) Prison-based treatment services
- (3) Community support systems and recovery support programs for the reintegration of drug offenders

The program's main objective is to strengthen member states' institutional and human capacities to optimize the quality of services in drug prevention programs and treatment facilities through evidence-based training, technical assistance and the application of technology; and by the establishment of a certification mechanism for drug prevention and treatment personnel by national authorities.

<u>University Partnerships in Latin America and the</u> Caribbean:

Short Description:

Since 1997, ES/CICAD has been working with more than 150 schools in 19 countries of Latin America and has educated more than 50,000 students on drug related issues in the programmatic areas of demand reduction: promotion of a healthy and sustainable lifestyle, prevention of drug use and abuse, treatment, rehabilitation and social integration.

In 2011, ES/CICAD started working with 13 universities in 8 countries of the Caribbean to educate faculty, undergraduate, and graduate students on drug related issues in the programmatic areas of demand reduction.

The three main components of the project are education, outreach activities, and research: The project uses an "integrated model" approach that draws on all relevant academic disciplines within the university, such as medicine, nursing, public health, sociology, social work, psychology, social communication.

This program is an initiative of the ES/CICAD, in partnership with the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH)-Toronto, Canada (2006). This program has trained a total of 71 health related professionals from 20 countries in Latin America and the Caribbean from the following academic areas: medicine, public health, nursing, psychology, sociology, social work, education, law, statistics.

Program to increase the awareness of drug control enforcement and regulatory/administrative officers as well as chemists, prosecutors, judges and others concerned with the control of synthetic drugs regarding this constantly evolving problem and enhance their skills, knowledge and capacity to safely monitor, detect and interdict the production and trafficking of synthetic drugs and respond to new drugs, production techniques and trafficking methods

Short Description:

Program to increase the capacity of officers (police, customs, regulatory, administrative control, chemists, judges, prosecutors and others) concerning the control of pharmaceutical products subject to diversion, trafficking and misuse and enhance the skills and knowledge they require to minimize the diversion of these drugs while ensuring their availability for legitimate medical or scientific purposes and responding to new techniques of trafficking such as sales through the internet

Program to enhance the capacity, skills and knowledge of counterdrug enforcement officers (police, customs, navy, coast guard etc) increasing their knowledge of the special investigative techniques, skills and approaches necessary to effectively monitor, investigate and interdict cases of illicit drug production and trafficking

Strengthening of National Systems for Investigating Assets and Administration of Seized and Forfeited Goods in Latin America (BIDAL)

Short Description:

Strengthen the capacity of the member states in the investigation of assets, seizures, forfeitures, administration, and disposition of assets from narcotrafficking and money laundering crimes.

One of the principal components of the BIDAL Project is to work on-site, in-country directly with the country. Together CICAD and the member state identify the strengths and weaknesses in the seizure process, from the beginning with the investigation of assets to identification and seizure of assets. This investigation is then used to identify the problems in the receipt, custodianship and administration, and the delivery of seized goods to their final destination in accordance with the laws of that country.

<u>Training program in maintenance, protection and</u> disposition of seized and forfeited assets:

Short Description:

The objective of this program is to assist with better maintenance, protection, and disposition of seized and forfeited assets. Experts from the United States (US Marshals), Colombia, Costa Rica, Mexico, Spain, and regional experts provide instruction to staff of the offices of asset management, police, and prosecutors from each country. The instruction is based in the international recommendations (such as the OAS Regulatory Model), guidelines and best practices for forfeited asset management (best practices of the G-8), the application of national laws on confiscation of goods, asset management planning, inventory valuation and performance measures, the appropriate use of asset forfeiture funds to improve the operations of law enforcement, and monitoring of internal control over asset forfeiture funds.

Money Laundering Training Program for the Judiciary

Money Laundering Training Program For Law Enforcement

This program aims to support the Banks Superintendence of Peru in the creation and development of a national and regional training center specialized in money laundering issues located in Lima

Activities includes support in the design of training workshops, seminars and courses in different academic modalities aimed at professionals from public and private agencies with responsibilities in collecting, analyzing or investigating cases related with Money Laundering and Terrorism Financing and their related offences.

Additionally, it seeks to develop training courses at regional level in which participants from other countries in the region will be able to exchange experiences and knowledge on the subject with local officials and experts.

OBJECTIVE 5: Strengthen the institutional capacity of member states to prevent and effectively address drug trafficking, recognizing the details of the challenges, harms, and negative impacts faced by the producing, transit and consumer countries, through the promotion and strengthening of joint or coordinated operations and exchange of information and best practices.

OBJECTIVE 7: Strengthen the CICAD's institutional capacity to promote international cooperation aimed at implementing the recommendations emanating from the Multilateral Evaluation Mechanism (MEM) process, as well as the objectives set out in the Hemispheric Drug Strategy and this Action Plan.



The MEM Process – 2013 Activities

Sixth Evaluation Round

- February 27-28, 2013: National Coordinating Entities (NCE) Workshop (English) for 16 countries held in Nassau, The Bahamas. Trained NCEs on the new MEM 6th Round process, components of the evaluation instrument and reporting requirements.
- March 14-15, 2013: National Coordinating Entities (NCE) Workshop (Spanish) for 18 countries held in Lima, Peru. Trained NCEs on the new MEM 6th Round process, components of the evaluation instrument and reporting requirements.
- September 2013: Governmental Expert Group (GEG) Preparatory session scheduled to layout the basis for the 6th Round evaluation process and methodology.



The MEM Process – 2013 Activities

Sixth Evaluation Round

- October 2013: First GEG drafting session— will include analysis of responses to the survey and completion of first evaluation draft prior to transmission to member states (December 2013).
- In 2013: MEM Section will hold coordination meetings with government officials and workshops for national stakeholders/ National Coordinating Entities (NCEs) in a number of members states to be identified throughout 2013, in order to provide information about the MEM process and obtain the necessary political support and awareness for the 6th Evaluation round.

Legislation on Drugs in the Americas (LEDA)

Short Description

 Some national legal frameworks on drugs and subsequent regulations have been found to be obsolete or out of date in their application and desired effect of reducing the production, trafficking and consumption of drugs. As part of its institutional development mandate, CICAD has examined the evolutionary process of drug-related legal regimes through a multidisciplinary and integral approach with the aim to strengthen and work toward the harmonization of drug laws in accordance with international instruments and CICAD's Hemispheric Drug Strategy and Action Plan

According to the Plan of Action of the Hemispheric Drug Strategy (2010), the Executive Secretariat is mandated to publish and maintain member states' legal norms relating to drugs. The LEDA Program has complied with this mandate and now maintains the only publicly known compendium of drug laws for the hemisphere, including a collection of most relevant and up to date drug laws and regulations for its 34 members.

VI. The Drug Report

The publication of the Drug Report was scheduled by end of the first semester of 2013, and to finish this process, the following activities were carried out in 2013:

Summary:

- The Executive Secretariat performs a variety of basic support services for CICAD Commissioners, Expert Groups, national observatories, and national drug councils.
- In addition, activities have been designed and implemented to support the five programmatic areas of the 2011-2015 Action Plan.
- Estimated cash contributions for 2013 total \$10.7 million: \$1.7 million from the OAS Regular Fund and \$9.0 million from specific funds.
- We expect total expenditures of \$14.1 million, depending on availability of funds.
- In-kind and counterpart contributions are essential to the implementation of CICAD programs. The Executive Secretariat expects to receive in-kind and counterpart contributions similar to those received in previous years.
- Additional resources would enable the Executive Secretariat to cover in a more comprehensive fashion the range of activities contemplated in the Action Plan.



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
