Soon after the conclusion of the opening ceremonies, the delegates parted ways and congregated to their respective committee rooms. The delegates in the Third Committee settled into their eighth floor room with a sense of excitement to begin the conference. After introductions of the chair and his co-chairs, two representatives of the Organization of American States eloquently spoke to the eager students about the role of cultural and integral development in the organization and around the world.

The first speaker urged the committee to draft resolutions that give voices to people in different countries that do not have a voice. The Third Committee will also strive to target communities that are discriminated against, such as the LGBTQ community, and work to free them from cultural oppression. The second speaker, originally from Barbados, reiterated the idea that there is a great need to understand who “we” are. She noted that only when the people of the Americas can understand each other, will they develop deeper respect and empathy for each other. She finished her speech but stating that “culture is a cross-cutting subject because at the end of the day, culture is who we are, it is our lives.”

It was a successful first day in the third committee. Delegates plan on fostering civil society participation, and intend to further expand access to basic human rights for people across the Americas. Tomorrow, the committee will split into sub-groups and begin drafting resolutions.

Today, two OAS experts Pamela Molina and Roberto Rojas spoke to the delegates about Fourth Committee goals. Protecting biodiversity is a priority. We need to reduce our carbon footprint and leave the next generation with a better environment than we were left with. As a Committee the delegates need to consider the need for bettering water supply, urban living, and health care.
