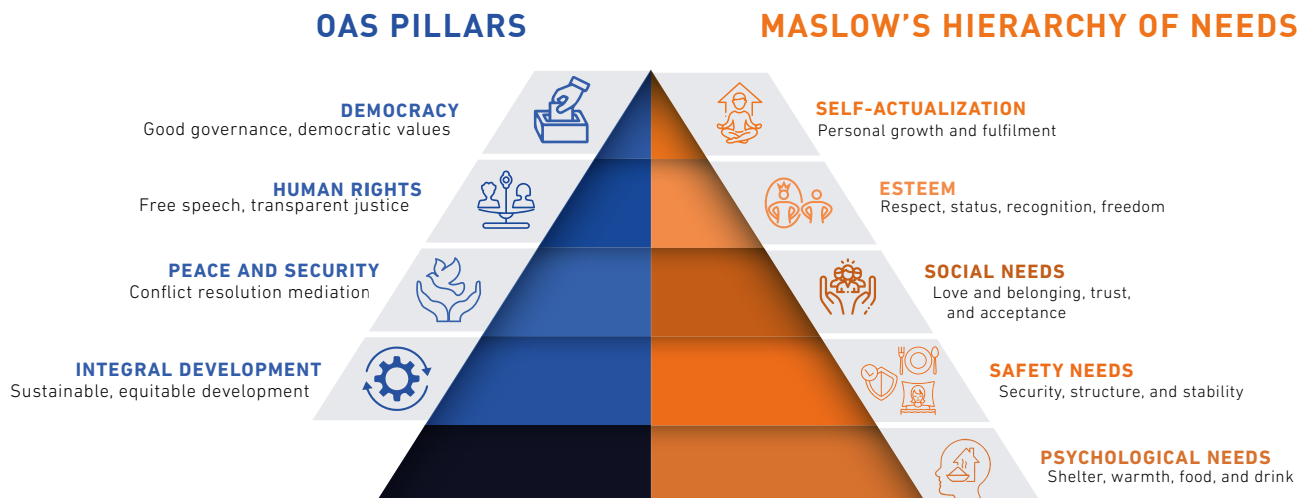

The Underpinning Role of Integral Development



The OAS Charter lays the groundwork for the mutually reinforcing and underpinning role of integral development, reaffirming that “integral development is the common and joint responsibility of the Member States, within the framework of the democratic principles and the institutions of the Inter-American system.”

True to this perspective, integral development as the foundational core pillar of the OAS supports a specific niche of inter-sectorial cooperation with cross-cutting areas of work which deliver value to both governments and their citizens throughout the Hemisphere. Policy dialogue; institutional, technical, and human capacity building; and cooperation for development comprise essential elements of OAS-SEDI's efforts to secure sustainable, inclusive, and equitable development in the Americas as a foundation for peace and security, human rights, and democracy.

OAS-SEDI's integral development approach emphasizes that efforts to secure peace and security, transparent justice and human rights, and democracy with full respect for democratic values are more likely to be sustainable when there is a sound foundation for integral development.

OAS

POLICY DIALOGUE

A hallmark of the OAS is its convening power – its capacity to bring together Member States from across the Americas and from different branches and levels of government—along with observer Member States and other stakeholders and partners— to address key challenges facing the region. Key to this process is CIDI, the Council for Integral Development. **One of two Councils directly reporting to the General Assembly, CIDI forms the basis for policy dialogue across the OAS and provides a permanent space for decision-making authority in matters related to partnerships for development.** Under the aegis of CIDI, Meetings of Ministers and high-level authorities represent a permanent dialogue to develop plans of action that guide the work of the OAS. They also enrich and feed into meetings of Heads of state through the Summit of the Americas process, helping to shape the region’s priorities.

11 Ministerial and numerous high-level meetings and processes related to development underscore the unique value of OAS-SEDI and supports what is **the most consultative, holistic approach to policy formulation and decision making at the hemispheric level.**

This **‘all-of-government approach’** represents a significant competitive advantage in formulating and implementing integrated development agendas that are not limited by a single issue, but rather benefit from inter-sectorial and cross-cutting input.

POLICY DIALOGUE MINISTERIALS

Cooperation

Specialized meetings of CIDI, like the sectoral meetings, were established to deal with special technical matters or to develop specific aspects of the inter-American agenda regarding substantive topics of interest to Member States.



Social Development

The Ministers and High Authorities of Social Development of the Americas meet periodically with the objective of outlining policies to eradicate extreme poverty, reduce poverty, and strengthen the national institutions responsible for social development matters in the region.



Science and Technology

The Ministers and High Authorities on Science and Technology present a forum for dialogue on the role that science, technology, engineering, and innovation play in the development of Member States.



Sustainable Development

The Ministers and High-Level Authorities on Sustainable Development define policies, activities, projects, and other innovative solutions-oriented outcomes that put the Americas on track to better address the causes of and promote resiliency to the impacts of climate change.



Through nine Ministerial meetings/dialogues, **SEDI leads, promotes, and secures sustained dialogue and sectoral processes among the highest authorities** as they engage in holistic, meaningful policy discussion to help countries address their varied development challenges.

Ports

The inter-American Committee on Ports hosts Regular Meetings to promote Hemispheric cooperation for competitive, secure, sustainable, and inclusive ports in the Americas.



Education

The Ministers of Education meet periodically to discuss education in the political agenda, exchange experiences, and review the progress of the mandates from the Summits of the Americas.



Labor

The Ministries of Labor of the hemisphere gather periodically at the Inter-American Conference of the Ministries of Labor, which is considered the main forum in the Hemisphere for discussion and decision-making regarding policy priorities and actions on labor issues.



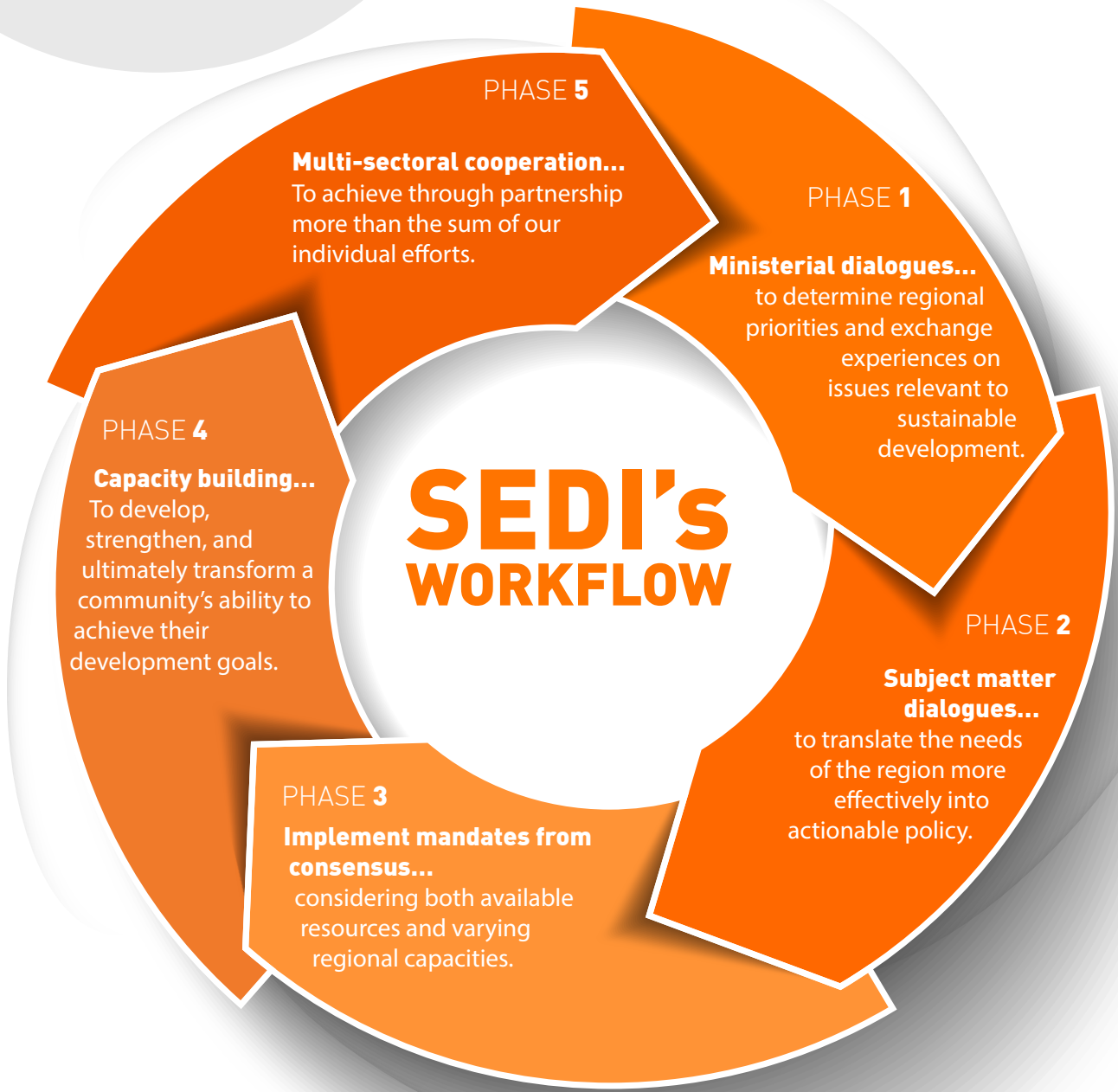
Culture

The Inter-American Meetings of Ministers of Culture and Highest Appropriate Authorities promote dialogue at the hemispheric level on the topic of culture within the political agenda.



Tourism

The Inter-American Congress of Ministers and High-Level Authorities of Tourism brings together the highest tourism authorities of the hemisphere as well as representatives from the private sector, academia, and civil society.



INSTITUTIONAL, TECHNICAL, AND HUMAN CAPACITY BUILDING

With a clear focus on providing effective and long-lasting development cooperation, SEDI works with Member States to enhance the capacity of institutions to design and implement policies and programs benefitting their citizens – including those in vulnerable situations.

Through Triangular, South-South, and Horizontal cooperation programs, networks, and technical assistance, Member States and practitioners are provided with opportunities to exchange ideas and transfer knowledge and skills to build their institutional and technical capacities.

This multi-faceted focus creates a multiplier effect in the region, strengthening public institutions and the policies, programs, and services delivered to millions of citizens in areas such as science and data for decision making, transformative technologies, climate action, Integrated Water Resources Management, education and human development, and labor and employment.

SEDI additionally works with governments and universities to provide training and make higher education accessible to thousands of students each year through scholarships and loans. Education not only transforms individual lives, but also impacts communities in ways which are both immediate and long-term.

COOPERATION FOR DEVELOPMENT

SEDI serves as a catalyst for sparking and expanding partnerships and cooperation for development by building alliances and networks, identifying potential areas for cooperation, and mobilizing the human, technical, and financial resources needed for effective programming. By pooling knowledge and experience from different sources, more innovative solutions are created to tackle the significant challenge of securing sustainable, inclusive, and equitable development cooperation in the Americas.

Cooperation for development is the model that drives SEDI forward – complementing and supporting each country’s efforts to meet their own development needs and priorities. This approach embraces all Member States, recognizing that each—regardless of size or development capacity—has valuable experiences to share and can learn from others to contribute towards more sustainable, equitable development outcomes.

South-South, Horizontal, and Triangular cooperation have become integral to SEDI’s development cooperation efforts, with many OAS Member States emerging as world leaders in advancing these types of cooperation.

The cooperation for development model also benefits from multi-stakeholder engagement to address cross-cutting issues, enabling progress to be made across deeper channels. Consequently, development cooperation programs are designed and implemented in partnership and in collaboration with other multilateral organizations, development agencies, the private sector, academia, and civil society.

SPECIALIZED COLLABORATION NETWORKS

SEDI's integral approach to development requires participatory and collaborative networks that foster specialized and inter-sectoral exchanges of experiences, lessons learned, and best practices - bridging political dialogue and technical expertise. SEDI's inclusive approach to development cooperation extends to its cooperation networks, complimenting traditional relationships between donors and recipient countries with collaboration between equal partners with similar priorities and needs.

Collaboration networks within the OAS ecosystem bring an important value add as they emerge from policy dialogue and are therefore established with built-in political support. These Inter-American networks allow the OAS to work among all Member States, providing an effective mechanism to promote connection and solidarity, strengthen communications and partnerships between institutions and countries in development policies, and expand the exchange and transfer of experiences and knowledge at the multi-lateral level.

SEDI's specialized collaboration networks represent an effective cooperation mechanism for development, advancing Inter-American development goals in ways which are inclusive, flexible, and responsive to the particular needs of communities of Member States.

HOW WE WORK



ONE SEDI APPROACH

The “ONE SEDI Approach” considers an integrated approach to programming and the elimination of silos as its twin objectives. It additionally builds on existing departmental synergies, promotes greater integration of inter-connected areas of work, and mainstreams certain cross-cutting issues—chief among them the issues of climate change and climate action—to advance sustainable, inclusive, and equitable development.

DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Department of Economic Development supports OAS Member States in their efforts to expand economic opportunities for their communities and citizens and make growth and development more inclusive and sustainable. It promotes policy dialogue and innovation-driven programs designed to help economic actors participate more effectively in domestic and international markets. These efforts are focused primarily on micro, small, and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) given their critical role in creating jobs, reducing poverty, and delivering prosperity with social inclusion.

Competitiveness, Innovation, and Technology

Empowering Member States to accelerate inclusive growth and development through the use of innovation, science and technology by convening high-level decision makers, facilitating capacity building, and fostering cooperation initiatives and partnerships.

Inter-American Competitiveness Network

Enhancing the capacity of institutions and stakeholders in Member States through policy dialogue to design and implement policies, programs, and practices to advance economic competitiveness.

Americas Competitiveness Exchange – The Premier Economic

Development, Innovation and Entrepreneurship Network of the Americas

Stimulating trade and investment partnerships, capital investment and job creation; strengthening ecosystems to grow local economies; and sharing solutions and good practices on economic development and resilience among key stakeholders.

OAS Youth Academy on Transformative Technologies for the Americas

Increasing access to skills for the digital and innovation economy through free online training and certification on transformative technologies to improve job opportunities for the communities of the Americas.

Prospecta Americas

Mapping and sharing of the latest advances and future trends in Artificial Intelligence, Blockchain, and other transformative technologies and their impact in sectors of critical importance for the Americas, as well as strengthening of foresight capacities to support decision-making and the formulation of public policies in OAS Member States.

Trade and Economic Development

Providing support to Member States by strengthening their institutional capacities to design and execute public policies and programs to expand market opportunities for micro, small and medium-sized enterprises, including through training, horizontal cooperation, and sharing good practices.

Small Business Development Center Networks

Strengthening the institutional frameworks of national MSME support programs.

MSME Competitiveness Program

Improving market access and access to finance opportunities for small businesses with a special focus on women and youth entrepreneurs.

Economically Empowered Women for Equitable and Resilient Societies

Enhancing the capacity of small-scale women entrepreneurs to benefit from the digital economy.

Culture and Tourism

Supporting the development of tangible and intangible cultural and tourism assets and cementing new and established links between the tourism and culture sectors to enhance their contribution to economic and social development in Member States.

Agenda on Climate Change and Sustainable Development for Tourism in the Americas

Promoting sustainable development for tourism and resilience in the face of climate challenges.

Agenda on Technology, Creativity, and Innovation as an Opportunity for Developing and Strengthening Culture

Promoting Methodologies and Policies for the Management and Consumption of Cultural Goods and Services in the Digital Environment.

DEPARTMENT OF SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The Department of Sustainable Development (DSD) supports OAS Member States in efforts to accelerate the transition to sustainability through policy and technical assistance; capacity building; enabling improved practices that lead to tangible environmental, social, and economic gains that foster sustainable development and Inter-American cooperation. DSD further promotes policies and strategies grounded on empirical data to enable long-term hemispheric security, democracy and economic prosperity while prompting inclusiveness and integration.

Integrated Water Resources Management

Promoting integrated water resource management—the “coordinated development and management of water, land and related resources”—to ensure sound water governance and integral development in transboundary basins, regions, and critical shared ecosystems in the Americas.



The Americas Water Program

By promoting water diplomacy, innovation, financing and governance at multinational levels, SEDI/DSD supports Member States in their efforts to improve the governance, management, conservation, and sustainable use of water resources - including freshwater and oceans. The program has a unique and globally recognized approach to transboundary water resources.

Sustainable energy

Supporting the development and use of sustainable energy technologies and services within Member States, enabling them to implement policies, laws, strategies, and actions for the advancement of sustainable energy.

Energy and Climate Partnership of the Americas

Promoting regional energy cooperation through innovative strategies and actions for accelerating the transition to clean, renewable, and efficient energy solutions that support Member States' sustainable development goals.

Climate Change: Resilience to natural disasters and adaptation

Supporting the priorities of Member States in adapting to and managing the increasing risks associated with natural disasters, with the ultimate goal of mainstreaming Risk Management (de-constructing risk) into development policy and planning across all sectors and levels of government.

Inter-American Network for Disaster Mitigation

Promoting the exchange of information and support for science and data-based decision making on vulnerability reduction, risk management, disaster response, and initiatives related to natural disaster risk management and financing alternatives.

Climate change mitigation

Supporting Member States in their efforts in adapting to climate change, facilitating decision-making information exchange and to enhance access to critical climate finance sources.

WHAT WE DO

DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN DEVELOPMENT, EDUCATION, & EMPLOYMENT

The Department of Human Development, Education and Employment (DHDEE) supports the efforts of Member States to increase access to quality education, life long learning opportunities for all, and build a more inclusive and sustainable world of work. DHDEE recognizes that education and employment are human rights cross cutting to the pillars of the Organization and essential factors in improving standards of living, driving economic and human development, and promoting social inclusion across the Americas.

► STRATEGIC LINE 3

PROMOTING EDUCATION AND HUMAN DEVELOPMENT IN THE AMERICAS



Education and Human Development

Supporting the strengthening of resilient education systems in the context of change through the development of policies, initiatives, and practices on education, and providing various activities, programs, and services to support education and employment in Member States, including scholarships and loans for academic studies and professional development; innovative online training and knowledge sharing opportunities for teachers and education policymakers; encouraging intersectoral dialogue among education, labor, health and with civil society; support for institutional capacity strengthening; and horizontal cooperation for education and employment.

Inter American Meeting of Ministers of Education

Providing a forum for substantive public policy dialogue among Member States on current issues in education policy and practice. During this process Ministers of Education establish an Inter-American Education Agenda for educational cooperation. It also serves as a follow up on education mandates emanated from the Summit of the Americas and previous education ministerial meetings.

Inter-American Committee on Education

Coordinating the implementation of Inter-American Ministerial dialogue on Education as the permanent mechanism responsible for the development and follow-up on the mandates and lines of action established during the Ministerial Meeting, identifying multilateral initiatives, and contributing to the execution of OAS policies in the area of partnership for educational development.

Inter-American Teacher Education Network (ITEN)

Working with policy makers, teacher education institutions, and classroom teachers to advance the teaching profession across the Americas by promoting knowledge exchange, capacity building, and technical assistance. In alliance with ProFuturo Foundation, ITEN is executing hemispheric initiatives that promotes collaboration with Civil Society Organizations. The initiatives are focused on the direct implementation of digital education solutions, such as courses on innovation and mathematics for primary school teachers, that empower students and educators with innovative digital tools and resources.

OAS Scholarship and Training Programs

Working with partners from OAS Member States and permanent observer countries to promote education and human development in the Americas, helping Member States increase access to quality, inclusive, and equitable education for citizens in SEDI priority areas.

Educational Portal of the Americas

Supporting Member States' needs on digital education and providing access to quality education opportunities in the Americas mainly through the use of information and communication technologies, providing innovative responses, and training for digital education in the Hemisphere.

Leo S. Rowe Pan American Fund

Increasing educational opportunities through financial aid for international students in the U.S. and GS/OAS staff members while fostering cultural diversity, friendship, and communication among the people of the Americas.

► **STRATEGIC LINE 4**

PROMOTING DECENT, DIGNIFIED, AND PRODUCTIVE WORK FOR ALL



Labor and Employment

Support OAS Member States in developing better policies and strengthening institutional capacities to create more and better jobs in the Americas; protect fundamental principles and rights at work; institutionalize social dialogue among workers, employers, and governments; and address emerging challenges of the world of work.

Inter-American Network for Labor Administration

Increasing knowledge and enhancing capacity of Ministries of Labor to improve compliance with labor legislation, advance gender equality, and address emerging or priority labor market issues in post-pandemic recovery such as work in digital platforms and informality.

Inter-American Conference of Ministers of Labor

Building consensus, ensuring collective actions, and guaranteeing the participation of workers and employers through two advisory groups: the Trader Union Technical Advisory Council (COSATE) and the Business Technical Advisory Committee on Labor Matters (CEATAL), in the main forum in the Hemisphere for discussion and decision-making regarding policy priorities and strategies on labor issues.

Business Technical Advisory Committee

on Labor Matters Increasing knowledge and enhancing capacity of Ministries of Labor, workers,' and employers' organizations to advance gender equality and inclusion of vulnerable populations in the labor market and address emerging or priority labor market issues in post-pandemic recovery, such as telework, work in digital platforms, and informality.

Trader Union Technical Advisory Council

Increasing knowledge and capacity of Ministries of Labor and Education to strengthen education and professional training systems to develop skills for the future and respond to labor market emerging needs.

TECHNICAL COOPERATION SECTION

The Technical Cooperation Section helps SEDI optimize partnerships, build alliances and networks, leverage development assistance, and provide more targeted technical cooperation initiatives. These efforts include moving towards an alliance model that is designed to offer Member States options for securing development assistance that is community based, locally delivered, and responsive to their specific capacity building needs as they lead and manage their own socio-economic development.

► STRATEGIC LINE 6

FOSTERING DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION AND PARTNERSHIPS



Development Cooperation Fund (DCF)

An innovative non-reimbursable technical cooperation instrument helping Member States access seed funding to support national and multinational initiatives, strengthen their institutional and human resources capacity, and promote Triangular and South-South cooperation.

Inter-American Agency for Cooperation and Development _____

Promoting, coordinating, managing, and facilitating the planning and execution of programs, projects, and “partnership for development activities” within the scope of the OAS Charter and, in particular, the framework of the Strategic Plan for Partnership for Development of CIDI.

Development Cooperation Fund

Implementing 18 programs under the 2021-2024 OAS/DCF Programming Cycle on “Inclusive Resilience for an Effective Recovery, with a Focus on Science and Technology”.

Cooperation exchange

The core of CooperaNet, whereby the needs of Member States are matched with solutions provided by other countries or different actors. The Exchange also offers a space for engagement among development partners through groups, discussions, and events.

Inter-American Cooperation Network (CooperaNNet)

Optimizing partnerships, building alliances and networks, leveraging development assistance, and providing more demand-driven technical cooperation in the Americas, while also facilitating the regional attainment of the Sustainable Development Goals.

Multi-Sectoral partnerships

Through both face-to-face and online interactions, the TCS facilitates engagement among multi-sectoral partners, build alliances for socio-economic growth, and match needs with opportunities.

Language Cooperation Certification program

Establishing regional partnerships with language institutions to promote the use of English, Spanish, and French, with the goal of fostering communication, integration, and cooperation between Caribbean countries.

WHAT WE DO

INTER-AMERICAN COMMITTEE ON PORTS

The Inter-American Committee on Ports is the only permanent forum that brings together the National Port Authorities of the 34 Member Countries and leaders of the maritime-port industry to promote the development of a competitive, secure, sustainable, and inclusive port sector in the Americas. The CIP fosters policy dialogue, capacity building, active participation and collaboration of the private sector, and additionally provides technical assistance and implements development projects. The CIP constantly monitors the gaps in a continuously changing maritime and port sector to bring concrete results to regional matters and challenges.

► STRATEGIC LINE 7

FOSTERING THE DEVELOPMENT OF COMPETITIVE, SECURE, SUSTAINABLE, AND INCLUSIVE PORTS



Port Development

The CIP develops competitive, secure, sustainable, and inclusive ports by working under four mandates: policy dialogue to promote an effective and constant political dialogue amongst national port authorities, capacity building to strengthen the institutional capacities of the CIP's national port authorities through high quality human resource training and its Scholarship and Training program, technical assistance to share best practices with and design specific project profiles for national port authorities, and private sector cooperation to foster innovative port development projects.

Secretariat Program

Hemispheric cooperation for competitive, secure, sustainable, and inclusive ports in the Americas.

Associate Members and Strategic Partners

Facilitating direct access to decision makers and industry leaders through North, Central, and South America, and the Caribbean.

Training and capacity building program

Strengthening CIP National Port Authorities institutional capabilities, through training, knowledge, and technology transfer activities.

Technical Advisory Groups
