Activities of the VII Inter-American Week for People of African Descent in the Americas

March 18-25, 2024

The Organization of American States (OAS) will celebrate the **Seventh Inter-American Week for People of African Descent in the Americas** under the theme, "*Global Freedom: Emancipate Yourself from Mental Slavery*," which was inspired by the words of Jamaican Pan-Africanist Marcus Garvey and popularized by the legendary Bob Marley in his iconic "Redemption Song." The activities will address the psychological and mental impact of the legacy of slavery by raising awareness about negative perceptions of African/Black people and culture, highlighting the societal contributions of persons of African Descent, and challenging preconceived biased notions about African/Black people and culture.

The OAS will host a series of events to celebrate the Week in keeping with the aforementioned theme:

A. Launch of the Week – Monday, March 18, 2024 | 2:00 pm

The Week will be officially launched at an in-person ceremony in the Hall of the Americas, at OAS Headquarters in Washington, DC, with cultural presentations centered around the theme of Afro-descendant culture and history.

B. <u>Special Session of the Permanent Council to celebrate the International Day of</u> <u>Remembrance of the Victims of Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade and the</u> <u>Inter-American Week – Monday, March 25, 2024</u>

The OAS Plan of Action for the Decade for Persons of African Descent in the Americas (2016-2025), AG/RES.2891 (XL VI-0/16), provides that the OAS must "*Commemorate every year on March 25, the International Day of Remembrance for the Victims of Slavery*

and the Transatlantic Slave Trade, by focusing on eminent persons of African descent who made significant contributions to the abolition of the slave trade, slavery and in favour of civil rights in the Americas."

The Special Session, which will include presentations by government authorities from across the Americas, will also commemorate the Inter-American Week and will be structured in a manner which offers a reflective discussion pertinent to the Week's theme.

C. <u>Profiles of Champions for the Promotion of African/Black Culture and Identity</u>

Member States will submit profiles of individuals who, in their professional and daily lives, and through their body of work, have espoused the virtues of African/Black culture, seeking to depict it from a positive standpoint and striving to eliminate the negative connotations and biases attached to African/black culture. These include renowned personalities that have uplifted and promoted African/Black culture in their respective fields.

Additionally, a Musical Playlist of songs which speak to the Week's theme will be compiled and disseminated.

Submissions will be featured on a dedicated OAS Website.
